
If everyone who takes the time to read this learns just one thing about our Departments and our City, we will have accomplished our goal.



## PD ORGANIZATION



Capt. Frank Rizzuto Patrol Commander

Patrol, the largest of the four divisions, carries responsibilities such as routine patrol, investigating crimes, apprehending offenders, investigating non-fatal traffic accidents and enforcing motor vehicle laws.



DCpt. Michael McGlennon Investigations Commander

Responsibilities include investigating crimes, targeting narcotics, interviewing suspects and officer training.

Detectives and Street
Crimes are in this Division.

Handles all reports of improper behavior of officers, internally and externally, in order to uphold the high standards of the Police Department.



Cpt. Peter Antonucci Support Services Commander

Handles the record keeping function of the Police Department, as well as the Dispatchers, budgeting and Traffic Bureau.

## F.D. ORGANIZATION



The Captain supervises day to day operations for the career department. He reports to the Public Safety Director and works with the Volunter Fire Chief to support operations of the Volunteer Fire Department. Pictured here is Captain Timothey Somers

Each career Lieutenant is assigned to and supervises a shift of career Firefighters. They report to the Career Captain and work with the volunteer Fire Department at incident scenes.

> There are four shifts of career firefighters. Each shift has four firefighters and one Lieutenant assigned. The firefighters work 24-hour shifts and are stationed at the Fire Headquarters located on Union Avenue.

The City is also served by the Long Branch Volunteer Fire Department which is headed up by three Volunteer Fire Chiefs who oversee nine Fire Companies of certified firefighters.

## SPECIALIZED UNITS



The FD Training Division is headed by Lt. Jason Smuro (left), who is assisted by Lt. Carl Griffin, FF Timothy Griffin and FF Nicholas Saffioti. These members are all N.J. certified instructors and provide regular required training programs to both the career and volunteer divisions of the FD.



The Hazardous Materials Response Team is comprised of members of both the PD and FD. This team responds as the mass decontamination unit in the event citizens are exposed to a hazardous material and provides specialized equipment to help clean off products that may contaminate individuals in an emergency. Members must participate in annual HAZMAT training administered by the N.J. State Police.



The Water Rescue Team, made up of members from the PD along with both the career and volunteer FD divisions, respond as a back-up in the event a water rescue needs support. They are trained in both swift water and ocean water rescue techniques.

Our K-9 Teams are P.O. Erik Wettermark and K9 Bala (bottom left) and Sgt. Robert Shamrock and K9 Danyo (top right). Bala is trained in Patrol and Explosives. Danyo is trained in Patrol and Narcotics. In adition to being called out for official service calls when needed, our K-9 Unit serves the community by participating in many different events and presentations throughout the year.

We are proud to announce that 2 K-9 Class Graduations took place in 2015, both organized and taught by Sgt. Robert Shamrock. Basic Patrol #2 graduated in January and Basic Scent Class #2 graduated in May. Sgt. Shamrock also trained with a new partner, K9 Hagan (top left) in the classes as Danyo is getting ready to retire this year.

















Our Urban Enterprise Zone Unit (UEZ) is run by Cpl. Joseph Graziano and P.O. Kimberly Leavy. The scope of their work focuses on a wide-range of of methods that maintain informational flow between the department and local businesses and community members. They provide a multitude of educational services throughout the year including the Citizens Police Academy, school programs, senior programs, business owner presentations, City Hall & PD tours, plus many more.



Our Motorcycle Unit rides year-round, weather permitting. They are tremendous asset in traffic control,

especially during high-congestion events. They frequently assist in motor escotrs, especially in dignitary transport and funeral details.



Class I Special Law Enforcement Officers (SLEO) are hired seasonally and help to maintain public safety during the busy summer months. They assist by patroling the beachfront, concerts, special events and by assiting full-time Officers in daily operations. An Open House is hosted once per year by Lt. Bard for interested recruits, generally during the winter months.

On January 26th, the Unit arrested a 39 year old Long Branch Avenue resident for a \$1000 failure to appear warrant. armed with information gained from Officers Olski, Eskridge and Pascucci, he was subsequently charged with robbery, burglary, and several counts of possession of a weapon (shotgun) and possession of a weapon with an unlawful purpose for crimes committed in the City in the 2 months prior, investigated by Detectives Verdadeiro and Zotti. Bail was set at \$200,000 with no 10%



A month-long investigation by the
Unit, led by Det. Lt. Jeffrey
Grippaldi, resulted in the arrest
of 2 men on July 25th for possession
of narcotics. They were also later charged
with possession of narcotics, distribution
of controlled dangerous substance (CDS),
distribution of CDS within 500 feet of a
park, distribution of CDS within 500 ft of
a public park and public housing,
distribution of CDS within 1000ft of a
school zone and operating a CDS
manufacturing facility.


The Street Crimes Unit is comprised of one Commanding Officer and three Detectives. Their primary focus is to eliminate drug manufacturing and distribution within the City and reduce the availability of narcotics and other illegal substances to ourcitizens. In addition, they serve as an intelligence bureau for criminals involved with weapons, gangs and other illegal activity. The Unit was reinstated in 2014, after a short disbanding. In 2015, they were credited with numerous high-profile arrests along with several drug seizures of substantial size. A few noteworthy cases are highlighted here.


On August 17th, 2015 members of the Street Crimes Unit, led by Lt. Jeff Grippaldi, and consisting of Detectives Joseph Spitale, Rich O'Brien and Nick Romano, arrested a 24 year old James Street resident. He was charged with 2 counts of terroristic threats and 2 counts of gang criminality after an investigation by Det. Todd Coleman, assisted by Detective Lt. Ray Chaparro discovered the man in in a video on social media sites making a threat to kill 2 specific members of the Long Branch Police Department. Bail was set at \$240,000.

On August 24th, 2015 the Street Crimes Unit, consisting of Detectives Joseph Spitale, Richard O'Brien and Nick Romano, conducted a motor vehicle stop in conjunction with an ongoing narcotics investigation. A 43 year old Paterson man was arrested and charged with possession of heroin, possession of cocaine, distribution of heroin 3rd degree, distribution of heroin within 500ft of a park, distribution within 500ft of federal housing and distribution within 1000ft of a school. His bail was set at \$180,000 cash only. Additionally, a search warrant was granted for his vehicle on August 26th which provided additional charges of possession of heroin, possession of cocaine, distribution of heroin 1st degree, distribution of heroin within 500ft of a park, distribution within 500ft of federal housing, and distribution within 1000ft of a school. His bail for those charges was then set at \$280,000, cash only. Total seizures from the arrest totaled 5359 decks of heroin, worth more then \$40,000 in street value. \$753 in cash was also seized, along with a Kia Optima.

In October, two West End Avenue men in their forties were arrested on multiple drug charges in a joint investigation with The Monmouth County Prosecutor's Office Narcotics and Gang Bureau. Investigators seized more than 4,000 bags of heroin, crack cocaine, power cocaine, marijuana, drug distribution paraphernalia, \$8,000 in cash and weapons, including a .22 caliber hangun, a 9 mm replica handgun and several knives. Both were charged with second degree counts of possession of heroin with intent to distribute, possession of cocaine with intent to distribute, possession of a weapon for an unlawful purpose, and certain persons not to have weapons; third degree counts of possession of heroin, possession of cocaine, possession of marijuana, possession of heroin with intent to distribute with 1,000 feet of a school, possession of cocaine with intent to distribute within 1,000 feet of a school; and possession of drug paraphernalia. Bail was set for one man at \$401,000 cash and \$551,000 cash for the other.



# **OPERATIONAL ADVANCES**



LBPD officers began carrying Naloxone Hydrochloride (NARCAN) in 2015. There were nine deployments since its inception. The LBPD patrol vehicles were outfitted with DMVR's-Digital Mobile Video Recorders this year and are currently being used by all of our oficers. The department is also in the beginning stages of aquiring Body Worn Cameras (BWC's). Several officers may be seen testing their use in the very near future.





The Traffic Safety Unit completed the huge task of equipping several new marked vehicles and retrofitting or upgrading an additional 30 vehicles. All of these vehicles have the same standard package including: emergency lighting, sirens, public address system, VHF radio, mobile video digital recorders (Dash Cam), mobile computer charging dock, locking rifle racks and prisoner containment systems. Some vehicles have specialized equipment such as radar units, automatic license plate readers (ALPR) and mobile command posts.





The new Quint #25-91 was placed into service in March.
A quintuple combination pumper or quint serves the dual purpose of an engine and a ladder truck.
25-91 is a 2015 Pierce, 75 foot aerial ladder with a 2000 gallon per minute pump. It is operated out of Fire Headquarters on Union Avenue by the Career Staff of the Long Branch Fire Department.

The use of conducted energy devices (CEDs), more commonly known as tasers began in 2015. Officers carrying these less-lethal weapons were required to attend a very rigorous training program during which a few were subjected to taser shocks themselves. No deployments were made in 2015.

# TRAINING

Members of the Police and Fire Departments are held to the highest standards of training. They must become certified on weapons and equipment and complete annual update and recertification training to stay up-to-date on the latest laws as well as state and municipal guidelines. They must also qualify at the range with their firearms. In addition, specialized units must complete additional training in order to hold a position of expertise within their field.


New seasonal police officers experience what it's like to be sprayed with oleoresin capsicum (OC).







Sergeant Antonia Gonzalez was honored at this year's Beauty & The Beach Run as Most Inspirational Competitor!


### ANNUAL S.O.A. & P.B.A. FUND RAISERS


### ANNUAL F.M.B.A.FUND RAISERS

Throughout the year several Fire Safety & Prevention programs are hosted by the FD at HQ and at local schools and clubs.






