This ordinance amendment was suggested mainly to require additional lighting to ensure security and safety, especially in the case of vacant buildings.

Commission members discussed the purpose for the amendment, and raised several questions, including:

- 1. The amendment doesn't state that lights need to be turned on.
- 2. There is no timeframe noted, such as dusk to dawn, for the lights to be on.
- 3. Section (5) shows maximum illumination levels, but no minimum. What's adequate?
- 4. Are existing buildings grandfathered?
- 5. Add types of lighting, including LED lights.
- 6. Add type of zoning or zoning district this applies to. Is this commercial only or does it include residential?

Motion by Stoneburner, supported by Nolan to deny recommendation to City Council until further clarification and/or modification to Chapter 50 "Zoning", Article XV "General Provisions", Section 459 "Exterior Lighting" ordinance can be made, as noted. Motion carried.

"General Provisions", Section 459 "Exterior Lighting".

Summary

This ordinance amendment was first brought before the Planning Commission at their meeting of January 27, 2025. Further amendments were made based on the input from the Planning Commission as follows:

- Timeframe was added, recommended to be "illuminated from dusk until sunrise"
- Illumination levels were added
- Types of lighting, including LED lights, were added
- Added zoning districts (all commercial and multiple family residential) EXCEPT One-Family and One-and-Two Family Residential
- The ordinance states "shall be sufficiently illuminated" in Section (1)
- Existing buildings are not grandfathered

The current ordinance is as follows:

Sec. 50-459. - Exterior lighting.

All lighting for parking areas or for the external illumination of buildings and uses shall be directed away from and shall also be so arranged as to not adversely affect driver visibility on adjacent thoroughfares.

Suggested amendments to the existing ordinance require additional lighting to ensure security and safety, location of lighting to prevent any nuisance glare, placement and shielding so as not to bother adjoining properties or distract motorists, and light fixture height limitations.

City staff members worked with the city attorney to draft these ordinance amendments because of complaints received from community members.

ORDINANCE NO. 2025-____

CITY OF ALGONAC

COUNTY OF ST. CLAIR, MICHIGAN

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ALGONAC, ST. CLAIR COUNTY, MICHIGAN TO AMEND CHAPTER 50 "ZONING," ARTICLE XV "GENERAL PROVISIONS," SECTION 459 "EXTERIOR LIGHTING."

THE CITY OF ALGONAC ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT

CHAPTER 50—ZONING

ARTICLE XV—GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 50-459. Exterior Lighting.

- (1) Subject to the provisions set forth herein, all parking areas, walkways, driveways, building entryways, off-street parking and loading areas, and building complexes with common areas of all commercial properties and multiple family residential in all zoning districts EXCEPT One-Family and One-and-Two-Family Residential shall be sufficiently illuminated from dusk until sunrise to ensure the security of property and the safety of persons using such public or common areas.
- (2) Exterior lighting shall be located and maintained to prevent the reflection and glare of light in a manner which creates a nuisance or safety hazard to operators of motor vehicles, pedestrians and neighboring land uses. These provisions are not intended to apply to public street lighting.
- (3) Only white, non-glare lighting such as metal halide, color-corrected high-pressure sodium, or other types of lighting which achieve the same effect shall be permitted. Existing lighting shall be allowed; all new lighting shall include LED. Lighting shall be placed and shielded so as to direct the light onto the site and away from adjoining properties. Lighting shall be shielded so that it does not cause glare for motorists.
- (4) Lights shall be recessed into the fixture so that bulbs or elements are not visible from adjoining properties.
- (5) Lighting for uses **adjacent to residentially zoned** or used property shall be designed and maintained such that illumination levels do not exceed 0.2 1.0 footcandles along property lines. Lighting for uses **adjacent to non-residential properties** shall be designed and maintained such that illumination levels do not exceed 0.3 1.0 footcandles along property lines. Light intensity shall not exceed a maximum of 20 footcandles in any given area. The Planning Commission, upon City Planner's recommendation, may allow for an increased level of lighting above maximum permissible levels when it can be demonstrated that such lighting is necessary for safety and security purposes.

Notes to Table of Minimum/Maximum¹ Footcandle Amounts:

- (6) Lighting fixtures shall not exceed a height of 25 feet. In portions of a site adjacent to residential areas, lighting fixtures shall not exceed a height of 20 feet.
- (7) All lighting, including ornamental lighting, shall be shown on site plans in sufficient detail to allow determination of the effects of such lighting upon adjacent properties, and traffic safety. Building or roof-mounted lighting intended to attract attention to the building and/or use and not strictly designed for security purposes is not permitted. Temporary holiday lighting is exempt from the aforementioned provision.
- (8) All lighting for parking areas or for the external illumination for buildings or grounds or for the illumination of signs shall be directed away from and shall be shielded from adjacent residential districts, and shall also be so arranged as to not adversely affect driver visibility on adjacent thoroughfares.

SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY

This ordinance and each of the various parts, sections, subsections, sentences, phrases, and clauses hereof are declared to be severable. If any part, section, subsection, sentence, phrase, or clause is determined to be invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, it is hereby provided that the remainder of the Ordinance shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 3. REPEAL OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

Any and all Ordinances of the City of Algonac or any parts or provisions thereof, to the extent that they are contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of the within Ordinance, are hereby expressly repealed.

¹The Maximum allowable footcandle levels shall be governed by the 4:1 ratio of average to minimum illumination of the surface being lit, expressed as the average across the total area of the site or building being lighted, or directly beneath a canopy, divided by the minimum from the table above. The planning commission may modify these requirements where they determine it is necessary to protect nearby residences or drive visibility on adjacent roads.

²Apron areas are away from the gasoline pump island, used for parking or vehicle storage.

³Light fixtures mounted on canopies shall be installed so that the lens cover is recessed or flush with the bottom surface (ceiling) of the canopy and/or shielded by the fixture or the edge of the canopy.

⁴The planning commission may require special conditions for properties adjacent to residential uses and districts.

SECTION 4. RATIFICATION

All other provisions of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Algonac, Michigan except as herein modified or amended are hereby expressly ratified and affirmed.

SECTION 5. PUBLICATION.



SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.
