Mission

Pesticide and Fertilizer Ordinance

- Oversaw the implementation of the pesticide and fertilizer ordinance
- Compiled and analyzed pesticide applicator report data
- Maintained relationships with local applicators


- Researched water testing strategies and provided recommendation to Council
- Water testing strategy approved by Council in November 2021




2021 Ordinance Compliance


- 32 licensed, professional applicators registered
 - 11 more than 2020
 - Many of the new applicators are pest professional companies (ants, mosquitos, house pests)
- 30 annual applicator reports submitted
 - 11 more than 2020
 - Not surprisingly, this 58% increase in the number of submitted reports resulted in a significant increase in the reported volumes of fertilizers and pesticides applied in 2021.

Note: Due to inconsistencies in the data reported these numbers are not considered to be 100% accurate but can be used as a rough reference point.

Key Takeaways

- Increased awareness and compliance
- Pesticide usage increased dramatically
- Most products used were synthetic

Next Steps

- The Conservation Commission recommends amending the Pesticide and Fertilizer
 Use ordinance with the following goals in mind:
 - Clarify some potentially confusing terminology
 - Add further restrictions of the use of certain insecticides.
 - Update the reporting requirement to increase accuracy and ease the burden on applicators

- Continued to implement a robust education campaign for residents
- Hosted YardScaping: Healthy Lawn Care Made Easy workshop given by Cumberland County Soil and Water Conservation District
- Provided lawncare tips via Falmouth
 Focus and Town social media channels
- Surveyed residents on lawn care practices

LIVING LAWNS LAWN CARE TIPS

Living Lawns offers lawn care tips that help make your lawn healthy and vibrant.

Tip #12: In a recent post, we recommended reducing the size of your lawn with ground covers and garden beds. Another way to do so is by establishing a No Mow Zone. This area is mowed only one or two times a year and allows native plants and grasses to grow. A No Mow Zone is a designated area that can progress through succession to return to a natural state. These areas provide an excellent habitat for pollinators such as native bumblebees. These zones allow plants to flower, which in turn provides a place for pollinators to stop and have a meal.

Tip #13: It is not the right time to fertilize your lawn! Applying extra fertilizer in the heat of summer can burn your lawn and create a flush of tender growth that will struggle in the hot summer weather. Never fertilize dormant lawns: Rather, wait until they green up in the fall if your soil test depicts needed nutrients. If you're leaving your grass clippings behind when you mow, you're giving your lawn all the fertilizer it needs, and it's free!

- Assisted with developing the invasive management strategy for 2021 with a focus on Pine Grove Preserve in anticipation of the harvest





Tree City USA

- Held a "Treemendous" Falmouth Arbor Day Scavenger Hunt May 16-22 with a search for 10 trees in Town
- Planted a black cherry tree at the River Point Conservation Area on May 17 to ensure that Falmouth's Tree City USA designation continues with the yearly planting of a tree

Earth Day

- Held two trash pick-ups in recognition of "Restore Our Earth" at River Point on Route 100 and along Route 1 from Waldo's to Bucknam Road
- Delighted that other Falmouth groups (Scouts, students, various neighborhoods) participated on an ad hoc basis at different times



Plastics Pollution

- Planned educational campaign to reduce plastic pollution
- Met with Wastewater team and Casella to better understand the dangers of microplastics
- Placed signage at Town Landing

Climate Action Planning

- Two FCC representatives are serving on the Climate Action Planning Committee
- Voted to support the Carbon Fee and Dividend Approach at the Federal Level




